The reasons for the Council's decision to grant permission for the development subject to the above conditions are:—

- (1) To comply with the requirements of Section 41 of the Town & Country Planning Act, 1971.
- (2) The erection of dwellings in the countryside is contrary to the local planning authority's general planning policy for the area and, were it not for the special agricultural justification which has been established in this instance, the development would not be permitted.
- (3) For the avoidance of doubt.
- (4) In order that the local planning authority may retain control over further development in the interests of residential and visual amenity.
- (5) In the interests of highway safety.

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## NOTE

(1) If the applicant wishes to have an explanation of the reasons for this decision it will be given on request and a meeting arranged if necessary.

(2) If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the local planning authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development, or to grant permission or approval subject to conditions, he may appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, in accordance with section 36 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, within six months of receipt of this notice. Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Secretary of State for the Environment, Marsham Street, London, S.W.1.) The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the local planning authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order, and to any directions given under the order.

(3) If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the local planning authority or by the Secretary of State and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he may serve on the Common Council, or on the Council of the county borough, London borough or county district in which the land is situated, as the case may be, a purchase notice requiring that council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part IX of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.

(4) In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the local planning authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on a reference of the application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in section 169 of the Town and Country Planning

Act 1971.

## Conditions / Cont'd

- (4) Notwithstanding the provisions of the Town and Country Planning General Development Order 1988 or any amendments thereto, there shall be no development within the curtilage of the dwellinghouse hereby permitted as specified in Classes A, B, C, D, E, F, G and H of Part 1 to Schedule 2 of that Order without the prior written consent of the local planning authority.
- (5) The developer shall construct the crossover to standards set out in the current edition of Hertfordshire County Council's "Specification for the Construction of Residential Estate Roads" and the development shall not be brought into use until the access is so constructed.
- (6) A 2.4 m x 2.4 m visibility splay shall be provided each side of the access, measured from the edge of the accessway to the edge of the carriageway within which there shall be no obstruction to visibility between 600 mm and 2 m above the carriageway level.
- (7) Sight lines of 2.4 m x 70 m shall be provided in each direction within which there shall be no obstruction to visibility between 600 mm and 2 m above carriageway level.
- (8) No development shall take place until there has been submitted to and approved by the local planning authority a scheme of landscaping, which shall include indications of all existing trees and hedgerows on the land, and details of any to be retained, together with measures for their protection in the course of development, and details of numbers, species and proposed planting location of all new trees, shrubs and hedgerows.
- (9) All planting, seeding or turfing comprised in the approved details of landscaping, shall be carried out in the first planting and seeding seasons following the occupation of the buildings or the completion of the development, whichever is the sooner; and any trees or plants which within a period of five years from the completion of the development die, are removed or become seriously damaged or diseased shall be replaced in the next planting season with others of similar size and species, unless the local planning authority gives written consent to any variation, and for the purposes of this condition a planting season shall be deemed to commence in any one year on 1 October and to end on 31 March in the next following year.
- (10) The existing hedge on the north-western boundary of the site shall be protected during the period of construction and such part or parts of the hedge as become damaged shall be replaced within the planting season following completion of development.
