- (1) The development to which this permission relates shall be begun within a period of ....... years commencing on the date of this notice.
- (2) No work shall be started until a comprehensive scheme of landscaping, including existing trees, for the site shall have been submitted to, and approved by the local planning suthority. This landscaping scheme shall be implemented strictly in accordance with the approved details in the first planting season following the occupation of the development and shall be maintained at all times thereafter to the reasonable satisfaction of the local planning authority.
- (3) No work shall be started on the development hereby permitted until details of materials to be used externally shall have been submitted to and approved by the local planning authority.
- (4) The development hereby permitted shall not be brought into use until the vehicle access arrangements shown on plan 612/75D shall have been provided and they shall be maintained thereafter to the reasonable satisfaction of the local planning authority.
- (5) Within three months of the first rateable occupation of the development hereby permitted, the existing dwelling shall have been desolished and the materials removed from the site. Cont'd....

- (6) The proposed development hereby permitted shall not be occupied simultaneously with the dwelling at present existing on the site.
- (7) The occupation of the development hereby permitted shall be restricted to the owner or operator of the adjacent petrol filling station and his family unless prior application has been made to and approved by the local planning authority.

The reasons for the Council's decision to grant permission for the development subject to the above conditions are:—

- (1) To comply with the requirements of Section 41 of the Town & Country Planning Act, 1971.
- (2) To maintain and enhance the visual amenity of the area.
- (3) To ensure the appearance of the development is satisfactory.
- (4) To ensure the minimum interference with the free flow and safety of traffic on the trunk road.
- (5) (6) & (7) To ensure the proper development of the site a new dwelling would not normally be permitted except as a special case which in these circumstances is justified for reasonable operation of the adjoining service station.

## NOTE

(1) If the applicant wishes to have an explanation of the reasons for this decision it will be given on request and a meeting arranged if necessary.

(2) If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the local planning authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development, or to grant permission or approval subject to conditions, he may appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, in accordance with section 36 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, within six months of receipt of this notice. Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Secretary of State for the Environment, Whitehall London, S.W.1.) The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the local planning authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order, and to any directions given under the order.

(3) If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the local planning authority or by the Secretary of State and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he may serve on the Common Council, or on the Council of the county borough, London borough or county district in which the land is situated, as the case may be, a purchase notice requiring that council to purchase his interest in

the land in accordance with the provisions of Part IX of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.

(4) In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the local planning authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on a reference of the application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in section 169 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.
