24 Flats and Access Road ..... ..... at <b>The Furlong, King Street/Park Road, Tring.</b> ..... .....	Brief description and location of proposed development.
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In pursuance of their powers under the above-mentioned Acts and the Orders and Regulations for the time being in force thereunder, the Council hereby permit the development proposed by you in your application dated **22nd September, 1978,** and received with sufficient particulars on **25th September, 1978 (as amended 24.11.78.)** and shown on the plan(s) accompanying such application, subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The development to which this permission relates shall be begun within a period of **5** years commencing on the date of this notice.
- (2) No work shall be started until a comprehensive scheme of landscaping for the site shall have been submitted to, and approved by, the Local Planning Authority. This landscaping scheme shall be implemented strictly in accordance with the approved details in the first planting season following first rateable occupation of the development hereby permitted and maintained at all times thereafter to the reasonable satisfaction of the Local Planning Authority.
- (3) No work shall be started on the development hereby permitted until details of materials to be used externally shall have been submitted to, and approved by, the Local Planning Authority.
- (4) Adequate arrangements shall be made to the satisfaction of the Local Planning Authority for the protection of all trees on the site, which are to be retained, to prevent damage during constructional works. Any trees accidentally damaged shall be replaced by approved species in the first planting season thereafter.
- (5) The access shall include the provision of 60 m. x 2.5 m. sight lines with minimum kerb radii of 6 m.

(6) All existing walls, fences, hedges and structures within the sight lines referred to in condition 5 hereof shall be removed before any other part of the development hereby permitted is commenced.

(7) The access road shall be laid out and substantially constructed to the reasonable satisfaction of the local planning authority with the exception of final surfacing before the remainder of the development hereby permitted is commenced and in any event shall be suitable to provide clear and convenient access to the dwellings when they are ready for occupation.

(8) No work shall be started until full details of boundary treatment to the site have been submitted to, and approved by, the local planning authority.

The reasons for the Council's decision to grant permission for the development subject to the above conditions are:—

(1) To comply with the requirements of Section 41 of the Town & Country Planning Act, 1971.

(2) To maintain and enhance visual amenity.

(3) To ensure satisfactory appearance.

(4) In the interests of visual amenity.

(5) & (6) To ensure proper development and in the interests of road safety.

(7) & (8) To ensure proper development of the site and in the interest of general amenity.

#### NOTE

(1) If the applicant wishes to have an explanation of the reasons for this decision it will be given on request and a meeting arranged if necessary.

(2) If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the local planning authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development, or to grant permission or approval subject to conditions, he may appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, in accordance with section 36 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, within six months of receipt of this notice. Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Secretary of State for the Environment, Whitehall, London, S.W.1.) The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the local planning authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order, and to any directions given under the order.

(3) If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the local planning authority or by the Secretary of State and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he may serve on the Common Council, or on the Council of the county borough, London borough or county district in which the land is situated, as the case may be, a purchase notice requiring that council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part IX of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.

(4) In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the local planning authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on a reference of the application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in section 169 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.
