In pursuance of their powers under the above-mentioned Acts and the Orders and Regulations for the time being in force thereunder, the Council hereby permit the development proposed by you in your application dated **23rd November 1977** and received with sufficient particulars on **23rd November 1977 (as amended 22nd December 1977)** and shown on the plan(s) accompanying such application, subject to the following conditions:—

- (1) The development to which this permission relates shall be begun within a period of **5** years commencing on the date of this notice.
- 2) The landscaping details shown on plan **4/1281/77** shall be implemented in the first planting season following the occupation of the development and shall be maintained at all times thereafter to the reasonable satisfaction of the Local Planning Authority.
- 3) The garages hereby permitted shall be used for domestic purposes only, incidental to the enjoyment of the dwellings within the same curtilage and for no other purpose.
- 4) The development hereby permitted shall not be occupied until the garaging, parking and turning facilities shown on plan **4/1281/77** shall have been provided and they shall be kept available at all times for use by the occupants of the dwellings.
- 5) Notwithstanding the provisions of the Town and Country Planning General Development Order 1977 the window in the first floor kitchen on the north elevation shall at all times be glazed with obscured glass and no construction as to be incapable of being opened below a height of 5ft. above floor level.

The reasons for the Council's decision to grant permission for the development subject to the above conditions are:—

- (1) To comply with the requirements of Section 41 of the Town & Country Planning Act, 1971.
- 2) To maintain and enhance the visual amenity of the area.
- 3) To maintain the residential character of the area.
- 4) To ensure the proper development and use of the site.
- 5) To ensure privacy for the occupiers of adjoining properties.

NOTE

(1) If the applicant wishes to have an explanation of the reasons for this decision it will be given on request and a meeting arranged if necessary.

(2) If the applicant is aggrieved by the decision of the local planning authority to refuse permission or approval for the proposed development, or to grant permission or approval subject to conditions, he may appeal to the Secretary of State for the Environment, in accordance with section 36 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971, within six months of receipt of this notice. Appeals must be made on a form which is obtainable from the Secretary of State for the Environment, Whitehall, London, S.W.1.) The Secretary of State has power to allow a longer period for the giving of a notice of appeal but he will not normally be prepared to exercise this power unless there are special circumstances which excuse the delay in giving notice of appeal. The Secretary of State is not required to entertain an appeal if it appears to him that permission for the proposed development could not have been granted by the local planning authority, or could not have been so granted otherwise than subject to the conditions imposed by them, having regard to the statutory requirements, to the provisions of the development order, and to any directions given under the order.

(3) If permission to develop land is refused, or granted subject to conditions, whether by the local planning authority or by the Secretary of State and the owner of the land claims that the land has become incapable of reasonably beneficial use in its existing state and cannot be rendered capable of reasonably beneficial use by the carrying out of any development which has been or would be permitted, he may serve on the Common Council, or on the Council of the county borough, London borough or county district in which the land is situated, as the case may be, a purchase notice requiring that council to purchase his interest in the land in accordance with the provisions of Part IX of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.

(4) In certain circumstances, a claim may be made against the local planning authority for compensation, where permission is refused or granted subject to conditions by the Secretary of State on appeal or on a reference of the application to him. The circumstances in which such compensation is payable are set out in section 169 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1971.
